## Message from the Chief Executive Officer

Last year marked the start of many new initiatives to enhance our programs and services as a child and youth mental health agency. In April 2010 we restructured to create an Infant Mental Health (IMH) Team. This new team will provide its expertise in parent/child relationships internally and to parents living in the broader community. This new program of the Centre is a direct result of the strategic directions adopted by the organization in 2009. The IMH team, working along with the Residential Counselors, will ensure that pregnant and parenting teens and family receive high-quality programs and services.

Also in April, we received terrific news. The Ontario Trillium Foundation approved an application for \$195,000 over three years to plan an implement the newly-created **Women Supporting Women (WSW)** program. **WSW** was designed to provide volunteer mentors supporting our young mothers when they move back into the community for at least one year.

On April 21, the Massey Centre experienced its first labour disruption when staff belonging to the Service Workers International Union (SEIU) Local 1 Canada bargaining unit went on strike. We were able to maintain limited services to our clients. There is no doubt that this was a difficult time for everyone: for the Board; for management and non-bargaining unit employees; for the bargaining unit members; for those who needed our services and could not access them; and for those who were receiving services during this time.

For more than a decade, Massey Centre had an accumulated deficit close of \$500,000. Over 90% of our funding is derived from government sources with the balance requiring fundraising efforts – more than \$300,000 from a \$3.8 million budget merely to meet the Centre's ongoing expenses. There had been no increases in funding from the provincial government – our largest source of revenue – in the three years leading up to negotiations.

It was clear that Massey Centre was on an unsustainable path. The Board of Directors and management had to get our financial house in order. The agency had a good track record of providing annual salary increases of 2% in each of the previous ten years; however, we reached the point where we could no longer offer a salary increase without knowing how, or if, we could pay for it. Further, the provincial government's *Broader Public Sector Compensation Restraint Act 2010* also impacted our ability to meet the demands of our employees. Bargaining unit employees remained on the picket line for ninety days. On July 21, 2010, a four-year settlement was reached.

This settlement could not have been reached without the support of the Centre's lawyer, William (Bill) Phelps, a partner in Matthews, Dinsdale & Clarke LLP, who provided us with pro bono services. We are forever in Bill Phelps' debt. His support to the management team was invaluable.

Since the end of the strike, labour and management have been working very closely together. A Healing and Reconciliation process of team building was planned and implemented. A final Report has been completed and presented to the Board of Directors. An action plan will be developed and implemented by the Labour Management Committee over the coming year.

There is much to celebrate and acknowledge in other areas of the organization. As we move to create the "new normal" at Massey Centre, our management team went on its first ever retreat weekend in February to reflect on our work and roles, and to make plans to facilitate future development. A Quality Assurance Committee was established under the leadership of Gauri Rangel, Manager of the Early Learning Centre and Evaluations, comprised of representatives from each program area and charged with the development of a Quality Assurance Plan. In March 2011, this Plan was approved.

A generous contribution of \$50,000 from the Nixon Charitable Foundation helped us secure the services of Dr. Jean Wittenberg, Head of Infant Psychiatry at the Hospital for Sick Children. We are thrilled with, and grateful for, this generous support; the work of Dr. Wittenberg will greatly assist Massey Centre as we strengthen our services in children's mental health.

We held many fundraising events this past years to meet our objectives: **No Sweetheart Required**, a Valentine's Day event in partnership with Whistlers'
Restaurant; a **Celebrating Motherhood Tea** in May 2010; **Bowling for Babies VI**, our signature fundraising event, in November 2010, and direct mail campaigns.

We are grateful to TD Waterhouse for its presenting sponsorship of our annual **Bowling for Babies** event, and to TD Canada Trust for its donation of rebuilt desktop and laptop computers. This year, each Massey Centre Secondary School student will receive a laptop at graduation. Our Board Vice-Chair, Dave Codack, connected us with Compugen, a technology solutions-focused organization, and its **Green4Good** program. We received \$30,000 from **Green4Good** last year to assist us in the purchase of a new telephone system.

Many thanks to all the United Church congregations and affiliated groups that make Massey Centre a priority for giving. This support – such as a donation of **8,000** diapers from Jubilee United Church in Toronto – is beyond astonishing, and helps to significantly reduce our operating costs.

A special thanks to our staff, who demonstrate their care, compassion and commitment to our most vulnerable clients. Thanks also to our Board Chair and the Board for their impeccable leadership of the Centre and understanding of good governance. We are also grateful to our program volunteers who help with parent relief, special events, and in our donations and clothing bank program.

#### MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR, BOARD OF DIRECTORS

This year, the Board has sought, very consciously, to solidify and refine our role within Massey Centre. The Board's purpose is to support and oversee the management of the Centre and, as such, does not involve itself in the day-to-day operation of the Centre. To deepen our understanding of our role, we held two Board Development sessions facilitated by a professional in the area of non-profit governance. These workshops provided training in the policy governance model and the role of the CEO.

In order to help us improve the efficacy of the Board, we invited a long list of guests, including representatives from the United Way of Greater Toronto, the management team, Children's Mental Health Ontario (CMHO) and several independent consultants to our Board meetings. These guests have informed us about specific programs, budgets, research projects and the ongoing process of reconciliation in the wake of the long and hard strike of the spring and summer.

The new management staff lead for program evaluation and Chair of the Quality Assurance Committee, Gauri Rangel, presented a detailed Quality Assurance Plan (QAP) to the Board; this tool has deepened our understanding of the challenges and successes of each program. It is very important that the Board be knowledgeable about all aspects of the work of the centre in order to provide effective leadership. The Board is deeply committed to supporting the CEO in moving forward through what has been a period of great change and ever-present financial pressure.

There are a number of other Committees hard at work, and I would like to thank the Chair and members of each Committee. Please know that your efforts help Massey Centre fulfill its mission of "starting new lives".

This year, we formed one new committee, the Community Engagement Advisory Committee (CEAC), detailed in the *Board Committee Reports 2010/11* insert to this Annual Report. The CEAC is comprised of representatives from the local hospital, academic institutions, government, the Toronto Police Service, and local decision-makers including our MPP and City Councilor, as well as Massey Centre's CEO and Board Chair. It is a mechanism through which the Board can gain access to a wide variety of perspectives about the Centre and create a network of strategic alliances.

On the recommendation of the reviewers from the CMHO accreditation process, Massey Centre has taken steps to increase our mental health treatment service delivery. Through a restructuring effort, a new Infant Mental Health team was established. This team is focused on creating healthy attachment between the mothers and babies we serve using an evidence-based attachment approached called *Watch Wait and Wonder*. This new and forceful emphasis on the mental health of our clients brings with it new challenges for staff and management and renewed efforts to find funding for programs and staff training. This is the right path, and the Board embraces the opportunity to support this important new direction.



This has been my first year as Board Chair, and, I must say, a very large learning experience. I am indebted to the support of our former Chair, Valerie Stief, and to our CEO, Ekua Asabea Blair. Ekua unfailingly keeps me and the Board informed of important developments and decisions, and is a deeply committed and excellent leader. It is a pleasure to work with her.

As for the Board of Directors, I cannot tell you what a pleasure it is to work with such a helpful, flexible, and devoted group of people. We have instituted a smooth system of recruiting, developing, and training new Board members, and I am very encouraged by the quality of people we welcome to the Board.

I would like to thank the administrative staff at Massey Centre who help the Board in so many ways. We are grateful for their support and for their professionalism in all their dealings with us. A special "thank you" also goes to our dedicated team of staff who work tirelessly each day to help our clients build new, healthy lives.

#### **OUR VISION**

We envision an inclusive community where parents, children and babies achieve their full potential.

#### SERVICE HIGHLIGHTS

If an organization can be said to have a "heart", at Massey Centre it is the variety of services we provide to pregnant and parenting teenagers in our residential transitional, community, and infant mental health programs. We also serve those in the larger community through Ontario Early Years and Early Learning Centre programs, and by promoting education, awareness and understanding of the social, economic, and mental health issues that surround and impact those we serve.

### Residential (Pre- and Post-Natal) Programs

Our prenatal residence provides activities in a group living setting to 22 mothers and babies. Mothers "graduating" from the prenatal residence are eligible to move on to our Apartment (capacity for ten clients) and Townhouse (capacity for 17 clients) facilities.

- Commenced an assessment of the Centre's intake process, resulting in a more comprehensive and holistic approach.
- A Breakfast Program, implemented during the labour dispute at Massey Centre to give the clients structure and support, was a great success, and is an ongoing program for postnatal residents.
- Last year, we received two grants to cover the cost of a complete renovation of the residential program kitchen. The City of Toronto's Homelessness Partnership Initiative provided over \$70,000; over \$30,000 was granted by the Ministry of Children and Youth Services, enabling us to complete the project.
- We also received \$63,000 from MCYS to undertake much-needed renovations to the prenatal residence client washroom in a fashionable black and white motif.
- Developed and maintained partnerships with a number of outside agencies, including Central Toronto Youth Services, Toronto Public Health, Jean Tweed Centre, Wrap Around, Oolagen, New Beginnings, Hincks-Dellcrest Centre, and George Brown College, to provide support and workshops for our residential clients in a number of areas.
- CYSIS client information database became accessible to all program staff.
- Secured funding through the generosity of the Nixon Charitable Foundation to implement and evaluate evidence-based attachment programs for adolescent parents and their infants, with the support of Dr. Jean Wittenberg of the Hospital for Sick Children.

- Building on positive outcomes from the evidence-based Watch, Wait and Wonder (WWW) program delivered in the Ontario Early Years Centre, Massey Centre was successful in receiving a \$50,000 evaluation grant from the Ministry of Children and Youth Services to offer WWW to high risk young parents and their babies in our postnatal residential program. WWW was developed in 1999 by Elisabeth Muir and Dr. Mirek Lojkasek et al at the Hincks-Dellcrest Centre in Toronto. Massey Centre's Child Development Coordinator worked closely with Dr. Lojkasek, who modified the implementation and evaluation of WWW within this new setting. The final report is now complete; it was very clear that the strategies developed within WWW improved the parenting skills of our young mothers.
- Annual license was renewed by the Ministry of Children and Youth Services pursuant to a review conducted immediately after the labour dispute.

## **Women Supporting Women**

**Women Supporting Women** is a three-year pilot program "matching" Massey Centre clients with volunteers who act as supports and advocates for the young women as they prepare to transition out of Massey Centre into the larger community.

- Launched in October 2010, response to the program has been overwhelming.
   Clients and community volunteers continue to be "matched" by the Project Coordinator.
- The program was celebrated with an "official" launch on May 25, 2011, attended by our MPP Peter Tabuns and representatives of the Ontario Trillium Foundation.

# **Community Housing, Information, and Referral Services**

The Community Housing, Information and Referral Services program works with all three phases of our pre- and post-natal programs.

- Community Program offices were located within the Massey Centre property to make the Community Worker more accessible to community clients.
- This year, Massey Centre's Community Worker assisted fourteen Massey Centre clients to find affordable and stable housing in the community.

#### **Infant Mental Health**

Infant mental health services at Massey support optimal child outcomes: a sense of security and selfesteem, the ability to form satisfying relationships, to engage with the world, to learn, to cope and problem-solve, and to continue positive development throughout life.

- Infant Mental Health Manager appointed November 2010
- Full team in place by March 2011, consisting of the Manager, the Infant Mental Health Coordinator, the Massey Centre Intake Worker, two part-time Registered Nurses, and one Relief Nurse.

- The team was supported by three students completing their placement requirements at Massey in social work, nursing, and psychology. Our social work student placement is a fourth-year international student from Fachhochschule (University of Applied Sciences) Potsdam in Germany
- Co-facilitated two weekly programs Cooking Club and Parent/Child Drop-In with Ontario Early Years Centre staff
- Nursing staff saw an average of ten prenatal residents and babies and fifteen postnatal residents and families each week
- Three father/child parenting workshops have been facilitated in the community by the team
- Infant Mental Health Coordinator continued to provide support to Ontario Early Years program satellites

# **Early Learning Centre (ELC)**

The ELC is licensed for children from birth to 3-1/2 years, with a capacity for 12 infants, 20 toddlers, and 16 pre-schoolers. Priority is given to young mothers living in, or attending school at, Massey Centre.

- 56 community clients were served this year.
- 40 Massey Centre clients received services this year.
- Due to the impact of the labour disruption, the overall number of days of care for this year was down significantly.
- Thanks to the hard work and commitment of the ELC staff team, we received a
  perfect score on the Metro Operating Criteria this year a first for Massey
  Centre. For more information, log onto the City of Toronto Children's Services

- Our annual Child Care Licensing renewal from the Ministry of Children and Youth Services was completed on schedule; we received a clear license to continue to offer services and programs.

# **Ontario Early Years (OEYC)**

Massey Centre is the lead agency for OEYC in the Toronto/Danforth riding. The OEYC is a place where children age six and under and parents/caregivers can participate in structured programs and learn about community resources.

 Overall numbers this year were impacted by the labour dispute. OEYC programs at Massey Centre (though not at the satellite locations) were suspended during this time.

- The Managers of OEYC and Special Projects and ELC and Evaluations worked collaboratively to help Massey Centre's mothers have timely access to day care subsidy.
- Participation in OEYC programs by Massey Centre residential clients and their infants have significantly increased over this year, and are projected to continue to grow.
- Thanks to the availability of space at Eastminster United Church on Danforth Avenue, we were able to resume OEYC programming in July 2010, about two weeks prior to the end of the labour dispute.
- We continue to provide early years services through a partnership with five other organizations in the Toronto Danforth Riding East York East Toronto Family Resources; Eastview Neighbourhood Community Centre; Parent Resources; S.E.A.S. Centre East Chinatown Centre; and South Riverdale Child-Parent Centre. The statistics in "Massey by the Numbers" reflect the number of clients served by all locations.
- Together with OEYCs across the province, Massey's OEYC families participated in a "postcard campaign" directed to the Honourable Laurel Broten, Minister of Children and Youth Services. The provincial government's recent announcement of the creation of "Best Start Child and Family Centres" throughout Ontario seems to be duplicating parent and child support services already provided by OEYCs, and the postcard campaign asked the Minister, and the government, to reconsider this issue.
- We welcomed Peter Tabuns, MPP for Toronto-Danforth, to an OEYC Family Day celebration in February, where he heard first-hand from parents and caregivers about the invaluable services and support they receive through OEYC programs.
- The Manager, OEYC and Special Projects, came together with representatives of Eastview Neighbourhood Community Centre, the Ralph Thornton Centre, South Riverdale Community Health Centre, and Woodgreen Community Services to plan and implement All Candidates' Meetings for Wards 29 and 30 in advance of the October municipal election.
- To identify needs and improve services to the "Cosburn Corridor" of Ward 29 and the area north of Danforth Avenue, the Massey Centre OEYC was invited to join Woodgreen Community Services and the South Riverdale Community Health Centre in the creation of NoDa (for North of Danforth). The group was successful in securing \$15,000 in funding from the Wellesley Institute to gather

 and analyze Social Determinants of Health data to clarify present and emerging needs for child and family programming in the area.

## **Resource Development and Volunteerism**

Resource Development and Volunteerism is responsible for overseeing activities geared to raising the \$300,000+ the Massey Centre requires each year simply to balance its books, as well as project and capital funding grants to meet specific needs. It is also responsible for the recruitment, screening and placement of community volunteers in a number of areas, primarily parent relief, donations/clothing bank, and events.



- Massey Centre was selected to participate
  in the Toronto Community Foundation's

  Community Knowledge Centre website in September 2010; essentially an
  "online shopping mall" highlighting a range of charities, the site went live in
  October 2010.
- Massey Centre revived its tradition of the High Tea and Social with
   Celebrating Motherhood at the Hunt Club on May 2, 2010. The event was a
   sell-out, the venue was a winner, and special guest Valerie Pringle was a hit.
- Seven volunteer information evenings were held during the year, with five to seven potential volunteers attending each session.
- 38 volunteers provided 358 hours of service to our clients in our parent relief and donations/clothing program in 2010/11, and to the organization as a whole as volunteers at **Bowling for Babies VI.** Thanks to all of you.
- The Board of Directors and volunteer mentors with Women Supporting
  Women provided hundreds of hours of service to Massey Centre and its
  clients that are not reflected in the numbers above; next year, these statistics
  will be tracked and included on an ongoing basis.
- Volunteers were to be recognized at a drop-in Open House event in late April 2011.




