Message from the CEO

Our mandate is to serve vulnerable young single women and help them break the cycle of poverty. According to the most recent annual report of anti-poverty group Campaign 2000, 38.2% of single mothers in Ontario live in poverty.

Poverty has an indisputable impact on the lives of the vulnerable young women and children we serve. Our efforts are focussed on helping our clients access the critical resources and skills to break the cycle of poverty and live independently in the community. One strategy to meet this objective is our secondary school treatment program. The young mothers have opportunities to finish high school and continue post-secondary education or training.

In October 2014, the Section 23 Secondary School Treatment Program was restructured to improve the credit-earning capacity of our young moms. This means that it is possible, with the revised curriculum, for a student in the school program to earn a credit every six or seven weeks. Attending the Massey Centre school she can now earn up to six credits each year. This restructuring, in partnership with the Toronto District School Board, has resulted in improved attendance and morale of the students.

When a young mother has earned her high school diploma and wants to pursue post-secondary education or training, she now has the opportunity to participate in the New Lives Start Here program

enabling her to continue to live in affordable transitional housing for up to four more years. Several enthusiastic young Massey mothers have already made this transition, thereby investing in brighter futures for themselves and their children.

Massey Centre is addressing the poverty issues affecting our client community. Our efforts—and those of our clients—are definitely bearing the fruits of success for the young parents and their babies. We are grateful for the continued support of our Board, staff, volunteers, funders and donors who all help to make this possible.

Why I Volunteer

On the occasion of my retirement, I was looking for a new volunteer opportunity—something different from the volunteering I had previously done with the elderly. As a long-time East Yorker, I had driven by Massey Centre for Women so many times and thought this might be the place for me.

"New lives start here" Massey Centre's motto, signified hope to me and the Centre didn't disappoint. Once I had successfully completed the thorough recruitment process—interview, questionnaire, criminal reference check, medical report, personal references and signing my agreement to observe the Centre's policies—I was ready to go.

I still remember my first "parent relief" session almost 10 years ago. It had been many years since I had looked after a newborn and I was very nervous. But, as I soon discovered, so was the new mom. She was very hesitant about giving up the care of this most precious, tiny baby to a complete stranger. Mom checked in on the baby and me periodically over the next two hours and we bonded and laughed about our shared anxiety. Of course, the little guy slept through the whole thing! Many parent relief sessions later, I have learned a lot: how to put on the new style of disposable diapers, the correct use of the curved bottle, how many scoops of formula to put in cooled bottle of boiled water, and that baby seats now vibrate!

I never get tired of holding a new baby in my arms, their soft breath when they sleep, their delightful smell, the smile of recognition when you do something funny, their hearty grip when they grab your finger, and the profound relief of a "man-sized" burp.

The plucky young moms who give birth to these tiny miracles love their babies to the moon and back and are determined to give the newborns a good life. Without exception, the moms have always thanked me for looking after their babies, but I think I should be thanking them for the opportunity.

Mothers at Massey Centre Host Art Show

Summer school students at Massey Centre who are young expectant mothers and mothers with children hosted their first art exhibit on Monday. The students developed their art skills in courses as part of the centre's Secondary School Treatment Program.

In partnership with the Toronto District School Board, Massey Centre offers young and expecting mothers a chance to complete their high school credits and continue to self-develop. They can complete their credits while caring for their babies in the classroom or preparing for birth.

"The idea is to encourage young women to continue post-secondary education," said Ekua Asabea Blair, Massey Centre chief executive officer.

"Many of the women are behind in their studies due to stopping to raise a child."

With no prior art experience, the students showcased several kinds of art including: pop, storybooks, graffiti, watercolour and murals. Much of the art reflected the love the young mothers felt for their babies; names and faces of their children dominated the theme of their art.

Some students live at Massey Centre while others come from surrounding communities. Blair says because of the stigma attached to being a young parent, art offers a means for young

mothers to express themselves. The aim is to let women realize their potential while staying sensitive to challenges facing new mothers.

"We want to help them cope with the stigma and the stress," Blair said. "We know it's not the end of the world, they can still finish high school, they can still develop their life skills they need to live as adults in the community."

One of the mothers, Jalisa Orr, 20, completed her summer school courses while raising her two-month old daughter. She scored an overall

average of more than 80 per cent, for which she was given an award at the art showcase. She'll be returning to Massey Centre in September to complete her Grade 12 credits.

"I used to live in the residential area, so that's how I got interested in the school program," Orr said. "I started going last year in November, I've completed my credits so I wanted to continue so I can finish high school."

"I think I'd like to do social work, I like to help people, I spoke to a lot of the social workers here and I know what they do for us so I want to do that for others too," she added.

Massey Centre has provided the Secondary School Treatment program for the past five years. It continues to provide other programs and support to address needs of young pregnant women and new mothers.

Striving for Quality 2014 Client Satisfactory Results

Massey Centre is committed to being accessible to those in need and ensuring that the programs and services are meeting the challenging and changing needs of the young moms, babies, and families. Last summer 53 clients responded to a centre-wide client satisfaction survey and here are some of the highlights of what they revealed.

Clients learn about the programs and services from (in descending order):



- •friends or family
- •referral by community agencies such as Children's Aid Society of Toronto/Catholic Children's Aid Society
- shelter or family doctor
- Massey Centre website

Our young families reported satisfaction with:

- increased knowledge about their children's developmental stages
- enhanced parenting skills and life skills
- opportunity for children to develop social skills
- opportunity for parents/caregivers to build social networking skills and learn about different cultures
- safe and stable housing
- increased sense of responsibility and independence
- quality and variety of food served to the children
- increased access to education and community resources
- opportunity to earn a secondary school credit in four weeks during the summer

Clients expressed a need for improvement or increase in:

- opportunities for client input in programs
- children's reading time
- parent/teacher meetings to discuss children's progress
- variety of program activities and materials
- workshops on daycare options
- program hours during the winter
- orientation process

We continue to make changes that align with our mandate to ensure enhanced experiences for every client.
